

▶ Level One “What” questions ◀

- Who is the central character of the parable in Luke 15:11-24? Why do you think this is so?
- What are the other definitions that Zac gave us for “Prodigal”?
- What does it mean that the Father’s love knew no limits? For His forgiveness to have no boundaries? His joy, no restraint? Who is this a picture of?
- What did the son in this parable do to deserve his father’s love?
- What have you done to deserve your heavenly Father’s love?
- What is the greatest title/designation we can attribute to God?
- Why, in your opinion, does God; the supreme creator, ultimate ruler and the paramount being want you to call Him father?
- What are the five ways the prodigality or extravagance of the father is shown?
- What are just a few of the ways our heavenly Father has shown His prodigality or extravagance to us who believe in His Son?
- What does it mean that we can bring joy to our heavenly Father?

▶ Level Two “When” questions ◀

- When have you ever (if ever) been a prodigal son/daughter?
- When have you ever experienced the prodigality of God’s love for you?
- When have you ever broken your heavenly Father’s heart?
- When have you ever brought Him joy?

▶ Level Three “How” questions ◀

- How can you begin to view the LORD as the father in this story, if you do not have that viewpoint or perspective of Him now?
- How could you “come to your senses”, as the prodigal son did, if you were in a similar situation – far away from your heavenly Father?
- How should you respond to the LORD because of His prodigal love?
- How has this message changed the way you see God? Yourself? Your sin?
- How close did the father in this story want his son to be to him? How close does your heavenly Father want you to be to Him?
- How soon does your heavenly Father want you to “come to your senses” and return to Him after you’ve been foolish and sinned against Him?
- How can you draw near to God in intimate, personal relationship?
- How can you continually live in the Father’s prodigal love?
- How can your Minichurch help you?
